2. Approval of Consent Agenda

(1) Decision on the Percentage Distribution of the Permanent School Fund (Board agenda page I-1) (COMMITTEE OF THE FULL BOARD)

The State Board of Education approved that the percentage distribution rate to the Available School Fund from the Permanent School Fund for fiscal years 2018 and 2019 shall be 3.7%, as recommended by the Committee of the Full Board.

The State Board of Education approved the BCG-proposed work plan in developing the Long-Range Plan for Public Education in accordance with the conversation and determinations made on September 14, 2016, as recommended by the Committee of the Full Board.

(3) Per Capita Apportionment Rate for the 2016-2017 School Year (Board agenda page III-1) (COMMITTEE OF SCHOOL FINANCE/PERMANENT SCHOOL FUND)

The State Board of Education adopted the per capita apportionment rate of \$390.186 for the 2016-17 school year, as recommended by the Committee on School Finance/Permanent School Fund.

The State Board of Education approved the issuance of a Request for Proposals for Passive International Equities Management Services for the Permanent School Fund, as recommended by the Committee on School Finance/Permanent School Fund.

(8) Decision on Real Estate Investments

The State Board of Education approved the recommendation of the Committee on School Finance/Permanent School Fund to execute agreements with Metropolitan Real Estate Equity Management L.L.C. or affiliates thereof, necessary to make an investment commitment of up to \$100 million in a non-discretionary separate managed account, and with Longpoint Realty Fund I GP, L.L.C., necessary to make an investment commitment of up to \$75 million in Longpoint Realty Fund I, L.P, subject to continued due diligence and negotiation of fund terms. All contract execution is hereby delegated to the Commissioner of Education.
